

I met the Harris Family in 1988 when they arrived in Paraguay. Marlin was a bright, educated leader who came with a clear vision of helping the then Baptist Hospital become an independent self-supporting institution but also one which maintained a clear vision and mission of serving the Paraguayan people and showing them Christ. He more than accomplished that task. Marlin was not just a fine administrator, he was a missionary, a church planter, a husband, a father and a friend. I had the privilege of working with Marlin at the hospital. He was a kind, wise leader who knew how to listen, how to analyze and think strategically. He knew how to bring out the best in everyone. It was an honor to work with him. More importantly I had the honor to live in community with Marlin and his family in the Paraguay Baptist Mission. Meetings and retreats, water polo matches, shared meals, and prayer, Marlin was always consistent in one thing: He loved God and he loved people. When he and his family returned to live in the US, he never let go of his mission of serving Paraguay. Through the establishment of the PBMCF he kept the vision alive in the hearts of so many, providing untold resources and support to the Centro Medico Bautista. Marlin lived his life to serve his Savior and in his passing, again glorified His Savior. I will miss him. Well done, Marlin... you were a good and faithful servant.

Praise God, for the life of Liz, Ramona, Crispín, siblings and members of the indigenous community Chamacoco, who come to our university looking for an opportunity to study for degrees in Nursing, and to serve their community with this profession.

Liz, Ramona, and Crispin, are the children of Crispulo and Rafaela, who live in Bahía Blanca, about 600 kilometers from Asunción, where they cooperate in the missionary work and are leaders of support for the new works. Crispulo is a mason, but his work is seasonal. Currently he is making a living by fishing and doing small jobs, to support his family and his three children who are studying in the university.

I believe that this is our opportunity to make a difference in this Community as a university, and as a foundation. For the current semester, the University has been able to provide Liz with a scholarship from the funds received from the PBMCF. For a cost of only \$1,400 per student per year we could provide these deserving students scholarship funds. This would give the Chamococo tribe access to much needed health care for the future.
